Sharat G. Lin is a research fellow and past president of the San Jose Peace and Justice Center. He serves on the Board of Advisors of the Initiative for Equality and was a contributing author to the book *Studies in Inequality and Social Justice* (2009). He has visited many areas of the world that experience war and upheaval, reporting on historical movements from the Cultural Revolution in China to the more recent battles against ISIS in the Kurdish region. He writes and lectures on global political economy, labor migration, social movements, and public health.



Eun-Joung Lee, Principal at Prototype Thinking Labs, is a consultant on strategy, experience design, and organizational transformation for major business and technical firms. Born in South Korea, she immigrated to the United States with her family as a young child. It was largely from watching the documentary *Legacies of the Korean War* that she learned about her parents' wartime experiences of loss and separation and was motivated to speak about the impact of silence on the lives of younger generation Korean-Americans.



Conn M. Hallinan is a columnist for Foreign Policy In Focus, "A Think Tank Without Walls," and author of the blog, Dispatches from the Edge, where he reports on a wide variety of international topics. An independent journalist, he writes for a number of online publications specializing in global affairs, and was a winner of a Project Censored Real News Award. For 23 years he directed the journalism program at the University of California at Santa Cruz, where he won several distinguished teaching awards and also served as college provost.
